Camera 

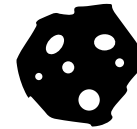
Magnifying glass

## TIPS

Look for cracks in rocks and pavement.

It is quicker for an ogot to build a home in an existing crack, rather than dig a new hole from scratch.



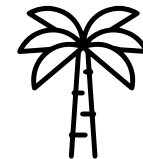
Look out for bumblebees.

Bumblebees help ogots reach high places.



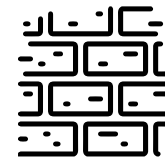
Pay attention to the trees.

Some ogots prefer living daringly high above the ground.



Look for shiny spots on concrete.


A glint is usually a piece of metal or mineral that an ogot has dropped on the way back from a scavenging trip.

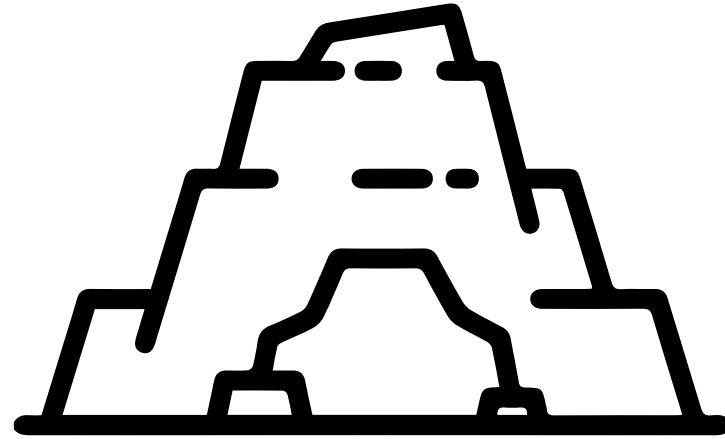
Observe and study it.

Plant a plant.
